My name is Alain Pineau and I am your delegate on the Board of Trustees of the CBC Pension Fund.

I retired from the CBC/Radio-Canada in 2005 after more than 34 years with the Corporation. I started as an editor in the French Radio Newsroom in Montréal and, over my four years there, did some reporting on air. In 1975, I became Assistant to the Director of News and Current Affairs at Radio-Canada, a post I occupied for three years, before going back to the radio newsroom as Managing Editor of the Montreal and French Network News.

I was appointed News and Current Affairs Representative in our Paris office in 1983, coming back to Canada in 1986 as Associate Director of the then bilingual National Capital Region.

In 1988, I went to Head Office, where I was successively Assistant VP for Planning and Regulatory Affairs, Associate VP for Regional Operations, and finally VP for Planning and Regulatory Affairs. When the job was abolished in 1995 I was appointed Director of the new pay audio service Galaxie and occupied this post for nine years, until my retirement.

In 2017 I was appointed as the delegate from the Pensioners National Association to the Board of Trustees of the CBC Pension Fund. There are seven Trustees: two from the CBC Board of Directors, two ex-officio Senior CBC Executives (the VP of Finance and the VP of People and Culture), and a representative each for the English and French Unions, and one for the Pensioners. Our responsibility as Trustees is to the Sponsor (the CBC), to current employees, and to current and deferred Pensioners. We must ensure, with the support of a very competent staff of 27, that the Pension Plan meets its commitment to Pensioners. We establish the general investment strategy, set the benchmarks investors must meet, and generally oversee the operations of the Plan. I look forward to meeting you at the AGM in Edmonton on Wednesday, September 18, 2019 to talk some more about our great Pension Fund!

# A Couple of Tips from a Couple of Travellers

In the autumn of 2018 we took a three-month trip to Europe and visited Portugal, Spain, Italy and Germany. Our trip was enhanced using accommodation and communication services that we didn't know about when we toured Europe four years previously.



First of all, in 2014 we relied on accommodation services such as trivago.ca, booking.com. and hotel.com to locate the best prices and locations; however, this often meant paying high prices for small rooms in prime locations. We rarely had kitchen facilities and relied more on restaurants and picnic lunches. In 2018, we decided on longer stays in different locations and booking ahead from Canada with Airbnb.

The basic idea is that private contracts are made to rent private accommodations, often full apartments or homes through the Airbnb website which offers some form of protection to both the owner and renter. We created an honest and relatively detailed account with our profile and picture so that owners could see who was making inquiries to rent. We then combed the website to find what was available in each location. Not only did we see pictures, prices and locations but we read reviews from former renters. That gave us a good idea of the pros and cons. We also discovered that longer stays resulted in significant savings. We saved hundreds of dollars by staying a few days longer as the monthly rate was less than the weekly rate.

But cost was not the only benefit of our Airbnb experience. We got to enjoy having full apartments with all the amenities (kitchen, washer/dryer, dining and living room, bedroom, patios or balconies) in prime residential neighbourhoods. This apartment living allowed us to live like locals, shop in neighbourhood markets, cook at home, and meet neighbours. All of our Airbnbs were wonderful and full of local character with stocked bookshelves, cable tv and wifi. We truly felt at home. At the end of each stay we rated or reviewed our stay on



the website and the owner rated us so that future owners could decide if we were good tenants. All in all we highly recommend using this kind of accommodation service particularly for longer stays.

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We also embraced what for us were new and better technologies to communicate and stay informed. Four years ago we relied on free wifi to access the web and send the occasional email. This proved cumbersome as we often felt obliged to buy a coffee to use a cafe wifi or else we spent time searching for wifi spots. Wifi service in hotels was slow and often didn't function. Canadian telephone and data plans are outrageously expensive for long trips and local SIM cards only worked in the country purchased. This year, we booked our SIM card from Canada prior to our trip so that a card would be available at the airport when we arrived. We picked Vodafone for our carrier as it was a big network and paid €20 for 1 month local talk/text/5G data that covered us in each country.

As for phoning home to take care of personal business or talk to people who did not use FaceTime, Google Duo or

Facebook, we discovered we could use the Skype app for a small fee. Through Wifi or data, we could call anywhere for pennies a minute. As well, many people in Europe use WhatsApp, a wifi service.

Some of these tips may be old news to you but for us they sure made our trip easier and less stressful. And that is what a holiday should be.
