The Wine Tour: On Saturday August 25th, members and guests of the Southwestern Ontario chapter of the CBC Pensioners Association held our 4th annual wine tour. While it was an unusually rainy gray day, it was perfect weather for tasting some of Canada's great wines. Wine has been commercially made in the Essex County area since the 1860's. Perhaps it our latitude, our soil, or the breeze off the lake, we have access to almost twenty different wineries here. Our popular (two buses) wine tour, organized by the chapter and their friend from the Caboto Club, Allessandro Sorrentino. Four wineries were on the itinerary for the day Sprucewood, Muscedere, Coopers Hawk and Versace. First stop was Sprucewood Shores Estate Winery. It's a 35-acre winery producing Chardonnay, Pinot Noir, Merlot, Cabernet Sauvignon and other varieties. The tour and tasting included a visit to the barrel room. Outside the stone winery, we learned the importance of bird control with the osprey platforms they built in the vineyard. Next was Muscedere Vineyards, a family run 15year-old operation on 163 acres, and Muscedere grows 12 different varieties of grapes for its wines. Famous for its wine and outdoor pizza oven, it's where our group stopped for a relaxing lunch. Complete with a visit from the vineyard goat. Coopers Hawk Vineyards near Harrow was our third stop for the wine tour. This vineyard creates twenty-two different wines. The off- the -beaten path winery is one of the most interesting facilities in the area, with a commanding view of the vineyards. You can probably spot a hawk flying above the vineyards. They do a good job keeping other birds away from the growing grapes. Vivace Estate Winery Amherstburg was our final stop. It was the former D'Angelo Winery. So you know their wines come from a great lineage. Although it was the smallest winery we visited it also had the most packed tasting room. We gathered up our purchases and got back on board our buses for the trip back to where all the fun began in Windsor. With all of us CBC Pensioners reminiscing and getting caught up on our after CBC lives, I'm sure a good time was had by all. Until next year, Dan Kennedy.
