We have identified recruitment of new members as our top-most priority, and we continue to ask you to help us identify retirees who have not yet joined so we can explain to them why their membership is so important to all of us.

Failure of the mediation process

Efforts to mediate a dispute between the CBC and the PNA and its Unions over the validity of the Memorandum of Agreement on Pension Surplus Sharing have failed to reach a settlement. Nevertheless, the mediators from Canada's Federal Mediation and Conciliation Services have asked the parties to agree to a suspension of the process in order to reflect on their respective positions. No new further mediation sessions are planned, and the parties are scheduled to take the matter before the appointed arbitrator, retired judge Dennis O'Connor, at the end of February 2022 for a binding decision.

The mediation had been requested by the CBC but the Corporation has reiterated its position that the deal, negotiated in 2009, has expired, notwithstanding the fact the agreement contains no expiry date and, in fact, calls on the parties to merely "review" the agreement every 10 years. The PNA and Unions challenge that position.

CBC Disbands the EAP Board

The CBC has decided to dismantle the long-running Employee Assistance Program, a decision that took the Pensioners National Association and the Unions by surprise. The PNA and the Unions were told of the decision after the fact, and after the staff were reassigned.

Dan Oldfield, the PNA's representative to the Consultative Committee on Staff Benefits, provided further details: "What we know at this point is that they have unilaterally killed the joint Executive

Board, which included representatives from the PNA, the Unions and the CBC that oversaw and developed strategy for EAP. It made this move unilaterally, a move that excludes employees and retirees from any meaningful consultation."

The National Board of the PNA will be lodging a protest with CBC management.

EAP services have long been provided by a third party. The oversight and direction of that third party will now come only from the CBC. Oldfield calls this "a short-sighted and unnecessary action."

The new program is described as "an integrated digital platform offering comprehensive total individual wellbeing (Well@Life) to employees and their eligible dependents from best-in-class third-party providers." Oldfield says this would seem to indicate that PNA members will no longer be included although that has not yet been determined.

The CBC executive in charge of the EAP program is now Vicki McCormick, the director of benefits and disability management. She hasn't responded to a request for further information.

New Brunswicker on National Executive



The Maritime region can now boast two elected members on the national CBC pensioners' 14-member board. In addition to the president, Geoffrey Turnbull, the new addition is Donald Langis, elected to the position of vicepresident (francophone) on the 4-member executive committee during the Spring triennial meeting.

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Donald worked his way up in the radio and television newsroom in the Moncton production center where he retired in 2005 from the news director position. As a retiree, he joined the Pensioners National Association (PNA) where he eventually became president of the Moncton Chapter. His election called for his resignation from this position and also from the EAP (Employee Assistance Program) where he was the association's representative. The New Brunswick chapter comprises nearly 200 members.

A Southwest NB Chapter?

I have been interim president of the Moncton Chapter for the past six months. During this time, I have spent many hours making phone calls and sending emails trying to bring to fruition something that is dear to many of us. Namely, the previous Maritime president John McKay, the current Maritime president Geoff Turnbull, past Moncton president Donald Langis and myself, Carole Ryan. We all hope one day to create a new chapter for Fredericton and Saint John retirees.

Neither Sleet nor storm nor pandemic will stop us

In an attempt to meet with association members in Saint John and Fredericton in 2019, my predecessors travelled through a snowstorm. Unfortunately, the weather was so bad that day, not many members attended. Not long after, in 2020, the pandemic hit, making travelling and meeting people from other regions difficult.

This fall, on the heels of so many getting vaccinated, we optimistically scheduled a meeting with these two regions for September. Regrettably, just before our scheduled visit to Fredericton, Covid-19 cases increased and we made the difficult decision to cancel. However, because of all the ups and downs of the pandemic and the changing health guidelines, they were not able to secure a venue.

I sincerely hope that many existing members will attend the Spring Luncheon this April / May 2022. We also hope that retired employees who are not yet members will attend and consider becoming members. Let's all work together to form a new southwest chapter in New Brunswick.

Sue Dexter has gone back to (Seniors') College

She may be retired, but she hasn't stopped learning

Sue Dexter had a long career as a successful radio producer.

Nearly ten years ago she decided she still had lots more to learn, so she became involved with Seniors' College in Mahone Bay, on Nova Scotia's South Shore.

"You haven't stopped living just because you are retired." And she says, "You don't want to be stuck at home... this program allows you to indulge in things you've always been interested in."

Seniors' College isn't a university course – but it offers a similar experience, according to Carol MacAskill, publicity

chair of Seniors' College Association of Nova Scotia (SCANS). "Our president likes to quote one student who told her she always wanted to go to university but couldn't. So now she can come here and learn. We like to make sure people know there is no homework, no tests and no stress!"

For Dexter, one of the best features of Seniors' College is the chance to explore subjects that interest you. "Some of the courses I remember with a lot of pleasure. One that comes to mind was about the history of women in Roman and Greek times. It was offered by the former head of classics at St. Mary's University who spent her whole life on these studies. She had made many trips and was very knowledgeable so she could really open up the topic for you. "

"Another one was about the Italian Renaissance. It was offered by Greg Galbraith, a retired high school teacher who had made a number of trips to Italy and was able to weave in his experiences as a traveller with the information about the statues and paintings he was showing us."

Dexter is not just a student. She has been on the local organizing committee and right now is helping develop a course on aboriginal issues for winter 2023.

"Seniors College is a really good deal," says Dexter. "For a single fee you can take as many courses in the year as you want and you meet a lot of brilliant people. They have been very successful in their careers and they don't want to stop talking." As you can imagine, many of the instructors are retirees themselves

About 700 Nova Scotians were members of the Seniors' College before the pandemic. There are programs in Halifax, Mahone Bay, Chester, Liverpool and Truro. The yearly fee of \$150 plus HST covers all three terms – spring, fall and winter.

The Association's Carol MacAskill is high on the social aspect of the courses. "People love to get together. And since the pandemic they are really missing these opportunities to share a tea or coffee and a snack and catch up with their fellow students, "she says. The

Halifax program is working to include more social time in its schedule as well.

The pandemic has made things difficult, but SCANS has been able to adapt, thanks to a hardworking group of technical volunteers who helped instructors create a series of Zoom-based courses. In the fall term, five province-wide courses have been offered.

MacAskill says the group is planning to return to inperson classes and a hybrid schedule for the winter term. But the decision hasn't been made yet as they watch and wait to see how things go with the Covid-19 pandemic.

"That can only happen when we feel we can do it safely – considering we are dealing with a more vulnerable age group since all students are 50+ years of age."

Before the pandemic, students in Mahone Bay could pick from 4 classes in the spring and fall and 2-3 in the winter, when travelling is more of a problem on the South Shore.

From TV producer to published author

Mary Munson's 41 years working for CBC television didn't prepare her for a big challenge she undertook in her retirement. She decided to write a book about fairies and fairy folklore in Cape Breton. "I made a documentary about the topic for *CBC Land and Sea* but I was dissatisfied and felt that I had to cut too many stories and that there was more to learn," she said.


So for months she gathered information and contacts and eventually started writing the book. "The first draft was flat and uninteresting. Many times I thought I would walk away from this project."

"After looking for the reasons why it wasn't working, I realized that my narrative was all about the *search* for fairies from Cape Breton. Realizing that freed me up to talk about the meetings I had with people, their frame of

mind and other aspects of our conversations."

"In many cases, I had to establish a relationship and tell people a lot about myself before they reached a comfort level to tell me their stories.

Friends are surprised by the characterization of the fairies on the cover of her book. "They are expecting Disney-type fairies with wings and fairy dust," Mary says.



Instead, she discovered the fairies of Cape Breton folklore are generally male, very small and dressed like the humans they interact with.

"They live in nature. Very rarely do they come inside any buildings or homes to visit." However, one Mi'kmaw



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story she collected is about the Witlakmu'jk coming inside to look for food.

Writing the book was a completely new challenge for Mary. "In TV, you are always working as part of a team that includes a camera operator, an editor and someone vetting with you. When you are writing a book like this, you are all alone without support. Even if you are Margaret Atwood, you are still sitting down each day to write on your own."

She admits her experience as a TV producer also was at the root of one of her first big mistakes in this project. Her TV experience told her to "book the guest" so she lined up numerous interviews. But she discovered that was the wrong way to go about the work. She needed to do a lot more preliminary research on the subject before she was in a position to ask the right questions in those interviews.

She also had to work hard at learning how to tell her story in this format. "In TV, you rely on the pictures to tell your story." Now, she had to develop the skills of creating scenes with words and dialogue instead of videotape.

"The Fairies in Cape Breton" should be available in bookstores all over Atlantic Canada by late November.
