The Pension Plan, The CBC and You

First and foremost, the Pension Plan is in good shape, in fact in such good shape, it could be in a surplus position at the end of this year. Great you say, I may be getting a payout. Not so fast.

In 2008, the CBC, the unions and the Pensioners' Assn. came to an agreement that if there was a pension surplus available for sharing, it will be shared between the CBC, its employees and its

retirees. The CBC will get 50% of the sharing surplus and the the employees and retirees will share the other 50%, based on a formula.

That deal called the Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) is now being seen differently by the CBC, the PNA and the unions and the issue went to mediation. The parties failed to reach an agreement and now mediation has been suspended.

The next step is arbitration, which begins in February.

In other words, that payout is a long way off, if it does happen.

For the Pensioners' Assn. to stand up for you against the CBC, it needs to be strong. It needs to show that it represents the majority of CBC retirees and this is where you can help.

Get involved with the Pensioners' Association. How you say?

Help your chapter organize events or run for office. It is not a tough job. It can be loads of fun. You can help recruit new retirees. We all know someone who hasn't join the Association. Urge them to join.

Remember, it's your money the Pensioners' Assn. is keeping an eye on.

While we are in a vaccine frame of mind.

The Covid vaccine is all many of us can think about these days.

So many questions...
Have you had your
second dose? Do you know
when you are getting your
booster shot? Which one
did you get? What kind of
reactions did you have?
And on and on!

So, while we are on the topic of vaccines, it seems an appropriate time to think about all the other shots middle-aged/seniors should consider.

Influenza – The yearly vaccine is recommended for all adults and, although it's not a 100% guarantee that you won't get the flu, it is likely the severity of the illness will be less if you get sick.

Pneumococcal

(pneumonia) vaccine – People over 65 should receive one dose of Pneumococcal polysaccharide 23valent. Once again, effectiveness of the shot can vary, but pneumonia is a serious illness.

From Canadian statistics, pneumonia is among the leading diagnoses for inpatient hospitalizations in Canada.



From 2018 to 2019, there were almost 67,000 inpatient hospitalizations.

Shingles (herpes zoster) vaccine - This is nasty and Canadian stats show that nearly 1 in 3 of us will develop shingles in our lifetime and the severity and incidence increases significantly after the age of 50. There is now a new vaccine called Shingrix which is much more effective than the earlier recommended one dose vaccine Zostavax II. Shingrix consists of two doses with the second to be administered between 2 and 6 months after the first.

Starting mid-October 2020, the Ontario Government began transitioning their publicly funded shingles immunization program from Zostavex II to Shingrix. Those who are between the ages of 65 and 70 are eligible as long as they have not already received the

free Zostavax II. If outside the eligibility criteria you must speak to your own primary health care provider and purchase the vaccine privately. Each dose of Shingrix costs \$150.00.

Looking at our own Supplementary Health Care Plan, the only clause I could see that might be related to covering injection costs says:

"Injectable drugs administered by a physician are covered to a maximum of \$15.00 towards the total cost of all drugs/injections provided on a single date of service at a clinic or doctor's office".

Tetanus, Diphtheria booster – As one of the websites I looked at re vaccines said, if when you step on a rusty nail while on vacation and you wonder if your shot is still current, it's probably worth checking with your doctor. A booster shot should be administered every 10 years; otherwise, your protection will fade.

The final caveat on all of the above is talk to your doctor on what shots you have had, what is safe for you, and what not.

Eye Exams resume for seniors and kids in Ontario

Optometrists withdrew eye services covered by Ontario, in Sept. due to a funding dispute.

That's all changed. Eye exams have now resumed since the Govt. and the Ontario Association of Optometrists agreed to enter formal negotiations in an effort to reach an agreement on funding fees.

At our recent AGM, we elected a new Executive. Maureen Brosnahan takes over as Chapter President. Maureen has served as a volunteer Director for the past two years and is looking forward to helping the Chapter continue to grow. Barrie Burhoe, the former president of the Trent Chapter, was elected as Vice-President, Glenn Gray was re-elected as secretary, and Randy Blyth, a former Chapter V-P, was elected treasurer. Barbara Saxberg will initially continue as Past President to help with the transition. We thank Dan Oldfield for his work as treasurer. Barbara and Dan will be moving out of the Durham-Trent region in the new year. Directors Bette Laderoute-Sampson, Dan Karpenchuk, and Mac Skelton have agreed to continue.

Our AGM guest speaker, Dr. Brian Goldman, provided his usual knowledgeable perspective on the pandemic, COVID-19, and the importance of booster shots. Joe Solway ably hosted the conversation. And we had updates from Dan Oldfield, the CBC PNA's representative on the CCSB, on the next steps regarding the dispute with the CBC over the Memorandum of Agreement regarding pension surplus sharing. The pension plan is currently in a healthy surplus position although any surplus sharing will be dependent on a valuation at the end of this year and the resolution of the dispute. In the meantime, an attempt to mediate the dispute in November did not succeed and it now goes to arbitration in February. One other piece of news: although the CBC unilaterally dismantled the EAP Board, Dan confirmed that retirees will continue to have access to the new EAP.

In addition to the elections, the Chapter updated its bylaws to reflect the addition of the Trent members earlier this year, and approved the treasurer's report and financial statement for the 2020-2021 fiscal year. The Chapter is in excellent shape financially and is looking forward to holding an in person gathering in the new year as soon as it is safe to do so.

The Golden Horseshoe Chapter of the CBC PNA held its Annual General Meeting on December 1st and like last year it was a virtual gathering over ZOOM because of the ongoing Pandemic.
