NL Association elections in 2023

Next May will mark the end of their terms for Vice-president Judy Squires and Treasurer Ruth Lawlor. The terms for President Jon Soper, Secretary Debbie Hussey and member at large Kevin Hanlon will continue for another year.

Pensioners Coalition activities

Your association through regional president Jon Soper is part of the provincial Coalition of Seniors, Retirees and Pensioners. This year, it met with federal and provincial politicians, including the relatively new Health Minister, Tom Osbourne. That September meeting touched on many concerns, including access to primary health care, support for seniors to age at home, universal pharmacare and the government's Health Accord.

The coalition also met with the new Seniors Advocate, Susan Walsh, during August. The priorities she identified in her early days on the job included housing needs, the rising cost of living, and healthcare issues.

Special Assistance Fund

The latest edition of our national newsletter, Contact, contains information on a variety of activities that affect all members. It includes an update on applying to the Special Assistance Fund for extraordinary health expenses. The CBC has transferred the administration of the fund to Canada Life, creating problems for applicants. Sign those CBC forms

In October, some of you received pink-coloured letters and forms from the CBC Pension Board of Trustees asking you to verify your address and any required information about power of attorney. The forms are legitimate and should be filled out. They're part of a continuing audit that the board performs each year to ensure payments are made correctly.

Don't forget about the province's furnace oil rebates
