Telephone 613-724-3003 Email info@cbcpensioners.ca Since its incorporation in 2000, the PNA has been very active and effective in dealing with matters of importance to former CBC employees such as the security of the Corporation's pension plan and the sharing of accumulated pension plan surpluses as well as the maintenance of a viable and affordable supplementary health care plan. Association representatives have also been involved in national lobbying efforts to preserve and improve acquired benefits for all Canadian seniors. Their knowledge and leadership skills have been recognized nationally when arguing successfully against the introduction of target benefit pension plans (Bill C-27) and advocating for post-retirement surviving spouses and partners who do not receive pension benefits.

The PNA membership fee -- amounting to less than a third of a cent for every basic pension dollar -- is a worthwhile investment in <u>preserving your future</u>. Every new member strengthens the PNA's voice when we're called upon to defend the rights and maintain the acquired benefits of all CBC/Radio-Canada pensioners. So we urge you to stand with your former colleagues and current friends – don't just leave it to others to protect the benefits we all share!


Historical facts presented by Paul Gaffney, former PNA President

June of this year marked the 20th anniversary of the founding of the CBC Pensioners National Association. Beginning in 1985, a national grouping of pensioners existed, based on the 20 Year Associations across the country and a more formally constituted Pensioners Association in Montreal. Over that time, the CBC had financially supported a national pensioners committee but there was a growing conviction that better attention to the needs and concerns of pensioners could be paid by a more independent and selfsustaining body. The CBC supported this position by funding special newsletters and mailings to enroll members in a self-sustaining retirees' organization. This led to the Montreal convention of June 2000, which approved a new constitution and bylaws, creating today's CBC Pensioners National Association.

The PNA Executive Committee from year 2000 to today

This summer, the CBC Pensioners National Association celebrated its 20th anniversary. To mark this special event, we are pleased to feature in this issue of Contact the Executive Committee members who have served as President, Vice-President Francophone, Vice-President Anglophone and Treasurer since the Association's founding Convention in June 2000. 



THE SPECIAL ASSISTANCE FUND – HELP FOR CBC PENSIONERS

Even though it's been in existence for nearly 20 years there are still a lot of people (retirees and employees) who are unaware of the potential benefits the Special Assistance Fund (SAF) can provide.

The CBC Pensioners National Association was an instrumental player in the creation of the fund along with the Unions. It was developed by pooling and investing monies that had been held in trust over the years by various insurance companies.

The purpose of the SAF is to assist pensioners and employees in paying for medically related expenses that are not covered by regular insurance plans. Since it's inception SAF has helped hundreds of retirees and employees and paid out more than \$2-million in benefits.

WHAT TYPE OF EXPENSES ARE COVERED?

Every CBC retiree and employee and their dependants are eligible for assistance up to a lifetime limit of \$12,500. To be eligible, expenses must meet federal tax guidelines for a tax-deductible medical expense. For many retirees, the fund has reimbursed for things such as hearing aids and mobility devices. Requests under the fund are reviewed quarterly by the Consultative Committee on Staff Benefits which includes representatives from the PNA, the CBC's four unions and CBC management.

HOW DO I APPLY?

PNA staff are always happy to assist members in preparing the application and making sure it gets into the right hands.

The CBC Pensioners National Association is the official representative body for all CBC pensioners on matters related to pensions and benefits. If you'd like to know more about the SAF or the role of the Association and membership please feel free to contact us.



Virtual Health Network

As you may be aware, the CBC Pensioners National Association along with the CBC and its Unions have agreed to provide the confidential services of a Virtual Health Network to its employees and retirees free of charge.

The one-year pilot project comes at a time when it's often difficult to make a doctor's appointment, fill prescriptions, get referrals to specialists or ask those personal medical questions.

The virtual health network called Dialogue is a service administered through Canada Life. It can be accessed through an app installed on a smart phone and through other mobile devices. It operates 24/7 in both French and English.

One click away from a medical consultation

During this critical time of heightened need, the Consultative Committee on Staff Benefits (CCSB) has agreed to temporarily fund the new virtual healthcare.

What is Dialogue?

Dialogue gives you access to healthcare professionals via a mobile or web app. You will be able to chat – or consult via a secure video – with a nurse for any questions related to your health, or a doctor if a diagnosis or prescription is required. All of this with complete confidentiality. You can also consult other health professionals that may be covered by our Supplementary Health Care Plan (SHCP). About 70% of typical walk-in clinic cases can be addressed via Dialogue, including:

- Receive or renew prescriptions;
- Request blood work or a referral to a specialist;
- Consult for minor conditions (allergies, UTI, infections, etc.);
- Ask questions related to your children's health;
- Consult the medical team for any questions related to stress, insomnia and anxiety.

When and where can I use the service?

You can use Dialogue if you are physically located in Canada. The service is available 24/7, but the medical scope of practice will exclude some services outside of regular hours (for example, you will not be able to refill a prescription at 2:00 a.m.). The regular hours of the Dialogue clinic in all Canadian time zones, local time, are:

Monday to Friday, 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Saturday and Sunday, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

How do I sign up?

Go to <u>https://www.dialogue.co/canada-life-cbc</u> using Google Chrome, Safari or Firefox. You can also download the app Dialogue Health on your smartphone.

- 1. Click on 'Create Account'.
- 2. On the next screen, click on 'Get Started'.
- 3. Enter your first name, last name and date of birth.
- 4.Follow the instructions to create your account (you will need to provide your CBC/ Radio-Canada ID number and the Canada Life Policy Plan number (177815).

Information on COVID-19

Dialogue is also up to date on the latest information about COVID-19. They have made available a virtual medical assistant named Chloe who can answer your concerns about the virus directly in the Dialogue application, or online. For any questions, you can reach their team at <u>canada-life-support@dialogue.co</u>. We hope this new benefit is helpful to you and your loved ones in this challenging time.

I met Suzie at the Pensioners National Association's office in Ottawa, which she shares with Dianne St-Germain, who manages the National Office.

To get to know Suzie better, let's start by talking about her work at CBC/Radio-Canada, where she spent 36 years. Suzie held several positions in the Planning department and worked in Information Technologies for 25 years. Suzie thus became a very sought-after computing specialist. Before retiring from the CBC, she was responsible for the IT Department in Ottawa, Moncton and Quebec. She also worked in Halifax and at the 2000 Summer Olympics in Sydney, Australia.

AN INTERVIEW WITH SUZIE BOUGIE

After she retired in 2009, she was asked to take charge of the PNA's computers, in the Association's office on Picton Street in Ottawa. When Dianne's assistant, Marcelle Miller, got sick, Suzie was asked to replace her. She has been assuming the assistant's functions for 6 years.

Suzie's work can be divided in three categories. First of all, as Administrative Assistant, she has to keep the PNA members' database up to date, address their requests or direct them appropriately. She prepares reports for the Treasurer, the regions and chapters. She prepares a welcoming kit for every new member. She ensures the Special Assistance Fund requests are complete. Prepares all the documents for the Board meetings and the Triennial Conventions. Suzie is responsible for the layout and distribution of the PNA's newsletter Contact, by email or by post. She carries out other related tasks of the administrative assistant which would be too long to list here.

Suzie's second responsibility at the PNA's national office is as IT Specialist. She is responsible for the acquisition, installation, maintenance of all computer media and oversees the proper functioning of all the hardware. She protects the members' database against all external intrusions and offers computing assistance for all users.

Thirdly, Suzie is the PNA's Webmaster. She oversees the Association's website content, ensures that the site is up to date, stays in contact with the site's developers, activates the account of new members and helps them modify their password or configure their account. Every month, Suzie posts an article on the site with pertinent information for members. She works three days a week and her days are pretty busy as you can see.

In her personal life, Suzie has one daughter and two granddaughters, aged 25 and 17 that she loves to spoil. In her free time, she volunteers for the Shenkman Arts Centre in Orléans, a cultural centre offering concerts, plays and several cultural events.

Membership is a Good Investment.


For less than one third of one percent of your monthly pension, you can help fund all of our important activities.
