Sharing the CBC pension fund surplus **THE ODYSSEY CONTINUES SO KEEP ON** BELIEVING

Golden Horseshoe Chapter **UPDATE** Feb. 19, 2024

CBC pension contributors should have received the "second notice" advising them of the intention of CBC to withdraw about \$130 million from the pension plan in order to meet the obligation to share surpluses generated in 2021 and 2022.

The notice was sent by mail on January 26th and via email on January 31st. People have been given 30 days to reply, although there is no requirement to reply.

Based on rough calculations it's reasonable to believe that the reply period will end sometime around March 1st. At that point the regulator (OSFI) would be in a position

to allow for the withdrawal from the plan and the payment to contributors.

However, there is no set timeline for OSFI to render its decision so we do not know when that may come. Once OSFI gives the go-ahead the funds are then put on hold for in ensuring protection of the another 40-days. We do not know the reason for this additional hold other than it exists in the regulations.

Barring unforeseen events and assuming the approval is given sometime early next month the soonest a payment could be made would be sometime in mid-April. In the meantime, pension plan administrators are doing the necessary calculations in preparation for the distribution.

While there is no requirement for anyone to reply to the "second notice" the PNA Board of Directors took the opportunity to make a few recommendations to OSFI about the process, its duration and costs.

While we very much appreciate and welcome OSFI's role plan, we believe there are ways to make the consultation process more accessible and timelier.

We will keep members informed as events unfold.

You'll know him from his work on the award-winning CBC Radio programme "White Coat, Black Art" which he has hosted since 2007.

On that show, he takes listeners inside the system, exploring the challenges facing patients and health care providers and introducing us to the innovators who are working to make things better.

Since 2020, he has also hosted the weekly CBC podcast "The Dose" in which he offers advice on how to live well and take care of your health.

In everything he does as a broadcaster, Dr. Goldman brings a unique perspective honed from years on the front line of health care as an Emergency Room physician at He has a long list.




Sinai Health System in Toronto. Dr. Goldman is also the author of five Canadian nonfiction bestsellers. His latest book - "The Power of Teamwork: How we can all work better together" - was published in 2022.

He says he is planning to give us a "State of the Union" talk on what ails health care.

His topline issues include the strain on emergency departments, specifically the lack of long-term care beds, gridlock and long waits in the ER, the ageing population, increasingly complex patients with complex needs and complex treatments, the crisis in primary care (the shortage of family doctors and the ones still practicing family medicine being overstressed and not having enough time to take care of complex needs), why nurses are quitting in droves and how we're just one respiratory outbreak from collapsing the entire system.

But it's not all bad news. He will also share insights into some of the fixes he's seen in Canada,

After his address, Dr. Goldman will take questions from the audience. We've set aside plenty of time for that.

All four executive positions are open, but at press time there were no contests underway.


The final step of the election is confirmation at the national Annual General Meeting in Ottawa on May 15. 5
