### **Pension Surplus Update**

Further to our <u>last update</u> on this topic, we continue to wait on approval from the Office of the Superintendent of Financial Institutions (OSFI) for the distribution of the 2021 and 2022 surplus.

Last month, we contacted the Office of the Superintendent to check the status on our surplus application. They advised us that while they are unable to provide an estimated timeline for a decision, their review of our file is ongoing and they are treating this application as a high priority, which will ensure that it proceeds as quickly as possible. So while we await further clarity from them regarding expected timelines, the Corporation is doing everything it can to proceed as quickly and diligently as possible, within legislative and regulatory requirements, to be in a position to issue surplus payments.

On a related note, the Pension Board of Trustees, who meet quarterly, have recently confirmed that the Plan is once again in a *surplus position* for the year that ended on December 31, 2023, as also noted in their quarterly communiqué <u>dated March 2024</u>.

As a result of this surplus, CBC/Radio-Canada is required to maintain a contribution holiday in accordance with the *Income Tax Act*. Therefore, the Corporation's renewed contribution holiday will continue through to the end of 2024. As with the contribution holiday announced at this time last year, the funds that are usually contributed to the Plan will be reinvested in our programs and services to Canadians for the duration of the contribution holiday. It should be noted that the confirmation of this surplus was anticipated and was incorporated fully in our budget estimates and planning for 2024-25.

The level of this latest surplus will also trigger another surplus amount to be shared with eligible Plan members. The actuarial valuation report of the Plan has been submitted to government authorities at the end of April to begin with the process for sharing this surplus.


We'd like to thank everyone for their continued patience regarding the payment of past surplus assets. The CBC Pension Plan remains in a healthy position and Plan members can feel confident about their pension. More on this will be communicated once we have received the required consent from the pension regulator. If you have any general questions or concerns about the Pension Plan, please contact the <u>Pension Administration Centre</u>, but remain mindful that they do not have access to more information than relayed here about the distribution of Pension assets.

pushed me into management, in which I completed my career attempting to do a decent job 🧐 and felt pretty good about after 37 years.






CBC, and forty-six years after I first "cracked" a live microphone.

When I retired, I knew Alma (my wife) and I would be financially stable. Some careful planning and some good fortune assured that. What I really hadn't planned out in detail was what I would do with my newfound spare time. I promised myself one thing - that I would take one calendar year to figure it out. No long-term commitments, no part-time job, no trip to an exotic destination. To use modern parlance, the idea was to merely "chill" for twelve months and see what fate might have in store.

My wife and my daughters gave me an acoustic guitar as a Christmas gift several years ago, and in a horrible show of appreciation, I stood it in a corner of our family room and allowed it to collect dust. All along, I promised them (and myself) that I would learn how to play it. One week after I retired, I took my first guitar lesson, and it's been a real gift. That was my single small concession to doing nothing for one year.

What that first year illustrated to me was how much I missed the structure of work. The Monday to Friday routine. The alarm going off at 3:45 a.m. Live on air from 6:10 to 8:40. Chasing stories and interviews for the follow day's show and heading home for dinner when most of the rest of the country was having lunch. I loved (and miss most of) the work, and the fun that came



I had made occasional trips to the Canadian Historical Aircraft Association's Museum at Windsor Airport over the years, and was (and am) fascinated by their collection of vintage warplanes and the stories that go with them. I am the son of a career soldier, having grown up at CFB Gagetown, New Brunswick. That comes with an affinity for the

uniform and a healthy respect for Canada's military. Also, I used to spend hours building airplanes from plastic model kits as child. Largely military airplanes - fighters, bombers and the like.

The CH2A, which their umbrella organization is called, rebranded itself a few years ago into what is now called the Canadian Aviation Museum. Their mission (love the term in this context) is to preserve an important part of Windsor's military history. It's military aviation history in particular. Also, to honour the veterans of Windsor-Essex who served Canada in any number of

roles. No doubt you've seen several of the museum's "yellow birds" flying in formation over various ceremonies in the area. Notably Remembrance Day services, our annual Battle of Britain Memorial Ceremony, the Dieppe Raid memorial and so-on.

It's directly because of a flight in one of the museum's historic aircraft, the 1937 Boeing Stearman biplane, that our youngest daughter



caught the aviation bug and now serves as a captain in the RCAF. Inspired by a 20-minute flight when she was in grade eight.

After "chilling" for a year after retirement, I purchased a membership in the Canadian Aviation Museum and offered my services as a volunteer tour guide. I've always thought of myself as a storyteller and this place is chock full of them. We like to think the museum is one of this region's best kept secrets. We're not overly proud of that, but we're certainly proud of the organization. One our goals is to remove that secrecy if at all possible.

We're easy to find. The museum is at Windsor Airport. That's the physical structure. You'll find us online at <u>canadianaviationmuseum.ca</u>.

BE it further resolved, that the PNA National bylaws and all subordinate bylaws be modified to reflect this change as to ensure that Chapter Presidents, or their alternate, will always be delegates at all future PNA conventions.
